From the Pastor



ANZAC commemorated last Thursday was a sad yet proud memorial. The fight that was lost in Gallipoli caused the loss of too many Australians. Yet it effected anti English sentiments and consequently a sense of independent identity for Australia. ANZAC Day eventually commemorated not only the fallen diggers of Gallipoli but all soldiers who sacrificed their lives for the integrity of Australia. There is an

increased awareness of the national integrity now. Therefore, mentions are made of other violence that challenges the integrity of Australia are heard on ANZAC day. It is important to be focused on the integrity of the country.

According to the Gospel of John, Jesus gave a farewell sermon, and it was about the integrity of the Church (the fellowship of the disciples) He left behind after His ascension into heaven. He used the imagery of vine and branches as an image for the Church. Just like the branches of the vine does not live without feeding on the life-sap from the main stem, the Church not connected with the person of Jesus will not live on. Most associations would count on the code of conduct of their members fore its integrity. But it is not the "dos and don'ts" that determine the membership of the Church, the Body of Christ; it is the personal relationship with Jesus the Lord that determines whether we are truly Christians. Doing this through personal prayer, bible reflection, and most importantly through Eucharistic Communion we keep our Christian integrity.

The church building where we celebrate Eucharist week after week is a profound symbol of our sense of integrity and belonging to the worshipping community. When the church was moved up from Ramsay Street to the present position on the top of the hill, it was a new beginning. Church guided by the Holy Spirit is always in the process of renewal. Under the pontificate of Francis, the Church is working on how to be synodal for renewed presence in the world. In this context, celebrating the platinum jubilee of the relocation of our church has a special significance. Let us celebrate it. I am open to suggestions and ideas. I propose to commence the celebration at Pentecost vigil this year.

Mission 70 program is to highlight how the parish kept up its vitality and who helped it. I want the young people to be part of the story telling. Alf Tornatore, the newly appointed Pastoral Associate, will help us in this process. You can help me get the message across to all parishioners by speaking about it especially to those who may not come to this church. You may also drop a parish bulletin in their letter box. The joy of this jubilee is not to be restricted to a few; ideally all Christians of Haberfield should get behind it. You may ask yourself, "what is my contribution to it?"

Writings by the Fathers of the Church

Christ is the day From a sermon by Saint Maximus of Turin, bishop.

Christ is risen! He has burst open the gates of hell and is about to fall. By this we are meant to understand let the dead go free; He has renewed the earth through the members of His Church now born again in baptism, and has made it blossom afresh with men brought back to life. His Holy Spirit has unlocked the doors of heaven, which stand wide open to receive those who rise up from the earth. Because of Christ's resurrection the thief ascends to paradise, the bodies of the blessed enter the holy city, and the dead are restored to the company of the living. There is an upward movement in the whole of creation, each element raising itself to something higher. We see hell restoring its victims to the upper regions, earth sending its buried dead to heaven, and heaven presenting the new arrivals to the Lord. In one and the same movement, our Saviour's passion raises men from the depths, lifts them up from the earth, and sets them in the heights.

Christ is risen. His rising brings life to the dead, forgiveness to sinners, and glory to the saints. And so David the prophet summons all creation to join in celebrating the Easter festival: Rejoice and be glad, he cries, on this day which the Lord has made.

The light of Christ is an endless day that knows no night. Christ is this day, says the Apostle; such is the meaning of his words: Night is almost over; day is at hand. He tells us that night is almost over, not that it

that the coming of Christ's light puts Satan's darkness to flight, leaving no place for any shadow of sin. His everlasting radiance dispels the dark clouds of the past and checks the hidden growth of vice. The Son is that day to whom the day, which is the Father, communicates the mystery of His divinity. He is the day who says through the mouth of Solomon: I have caused an unfailing light to rise in heaven. And as in heaven no night can follow day, so no sin can overshadow the justice of Christ. The celestial day is perpetually bright and shining with brilliant light; clouds can never darken its skies. In the same way, the light of Christ is eternally glowing with luminous radiance and can never be extinguished by the darkness of sin. This is why John the evangelist says: The light shines in the darkness, and the darkness has never been able to overpower it.

And so, my brothers, each of us ought surely to rejoice on this holy day. Let no one, conscious of his sinfulness, withdraw from our common celebration, nor let anyone be kept away from our public prayer by the burden of his guilt. Sinner he may indeed be, but he must not despair of pardon on this day which is so highly privileged; for if a thief could receive the grace of paradise, how could a Christian be refused forgiveness?

Reflection on John 15: 1-8

Living the Gospel – Bearing fruit

The vinedresser of this passage cuts away the dead branches and prunes back those that are not bearing fruit. In what way do we bear fruit? When we strive to reach our fullest potential in whatever we do, we bear fruit. When we act out of motivation for the other person rather than ourselves, we bear fruit. When we strive to bring about the reign of God in our small part of the world, we bear fruit. Sometimes we too need to have some of our thoughts and actions pruned so that we might better bear the fruit that we are truly capable of producing.

Scriptural context – In context

The imagery that Jesus used in his parables and in extended metaphors such as the one used in this week's gospel sometimes seems a little foreign to a 21st century audience. However, the world in which Jesus lived and taught was dominated by small scale farmers and producers in an agrarian economy. His use of images such as 'shepherd', 'vine', 'tenants', 'farmers' and 'wineskins' would all have been immediately recognisable to his audience. They would also have appreciated much more than we do the subtlety of Jesus' use of such images when he twists them in an unexpected way.

Historical Context – The 'True' vine

The image of the vine has its origins in Psalm 80 where the nation of Israel is likened to a vine: 'You brought a vine out of Egypt; you drove out the nations and planted it. You cleared the ground for it; it took deep root and filled the land.' (Ps 80:8-9) However, the people of Israel have forgotten who they are and who it was that planted them in their country – it is like the rootstock of a grafted plant has taken over and gone wild. Jesus' presence as the 'true vine' reminds them of what they are called to be.

REFLECTION Readings 5th Sunday of Easter

In these weeks after Easter and before the feasts of Ascension and Pentecost, our gospel readings come from Jesus' farewell discourses in the Gospel of John. These are the teachings Jesus shared with His disciples in that precious time just before His arrest and crucifixion.

His teachings offered solace to His disciples who were soon to endure His passion and death. We now read and ponder them in the light of his resurrection and Ascension. They also offer comfort to us in our time and place, as we face life's challenges and sorrows.

Last week, the gospel recounted Jesus telling the disciples that He is the Good Shepherd, who knows His sheep by name, who cares for them and protects them, and whose love and care are so great that he lays down His life for His sheep. This image of the Good Shepherd and His sheep describes a relationship of steadfast love and care.

This week, Jesus describes His relationship to his followers differently, this time in terms of a vine and its branches. This image highlights the intimacy, interconnection, mutuality and reciprocity of the relationship of Jesus to us, of Jesus to the Father, and of Jesus and the Father to us, individually and as a community.

Jesus explains that He is the true vine, the Father is the vine grower, and we are the branches. The image reminds us that we, just

like the vine and its branches, rely on each other in order to bear fruit.

But, most important of all, Jesus urges us: "Abide in Me as I abide in you." To abide means to remain, to stay, to dwell, to make a home in, to endure, and to hold fast. This notion of 'abiding' is of utmost importance in John's Gospel. (Even in today's short reading this word, abide, occurs 8 times.)

Jesus is very clear: this abiding is essential and core to our relationship with Him. It is this abiding in Him and He in us that will result in great fruitfulness. The fruits will be life-giving fruits, internal as well as external, for us personally and for the community. They will be peace, freedom, justice, joy, and the flourishing of creation.

What then is the call and the challenge for us? It is to nurture our relationship with Jesus. This is the discipleship to which He calls us: it is abiding in Him, keeping company with Him, living in daily conversation with Him. We are called to a life-long process of entering ever more deeply into this relationship with Him, learning to abide in His love, and learning to love one another as God has loved us. It is learning to live like that every day!

And, in the process, we will gradually come to better see the world, ourselves, other people, and whatever situations we face with our hearts and minds attuned to His.


