From the Pastor

The Nativity of the Blessed Virgin Mary

September 8 is the birthday of Mary. This year it happened to fall on Sunday and the Lord's Day takes precedence over the saints. Hence, there is no mention of this feast in the liturgical calendar 2024. That shall not stop us from celebrating the feast. The procession and the multilingual prayers during the 9am Mass will mark the day. Usually birthdays of saints are no feast days in the liturgical calendar, with two exceptions: John the Baptist, the forerunner of the Messiah, Mary mother of God.

There are no details on Mary's birth or her parents in the Bible. But an apocryphal writing, the Gospel of James, from the second century names Joachim and Anne as her parents. According to some traditions, Joachim was a rich man from Sepphoris, a town close to Nazareth.

Mary's birthday has been celebrated from the beginning of the sixth century, when after the Council of Ephesus, the cult of the Mother of God was greatly intensified. Prior to the 1954 liturgical reform, the feast was celebrated as an octave. Remnants of it can still be seen in some cultures. In Kerala, the St Thomas Christians fast from meat and praying rosary from 1 September in preparation for the feast day. In Mumbai, the feast of Mary's Nativity is celebrated with a weeklong event starting on 8 September and it is called Bandra Fair.

For many cultures, including Italians, Malts, French, Filipinos, etc, Marian Nativity and related devotions are deep rooted. Mary, Mother of God, is our mother, too. We have high esteem for her.

Christian Approach to VAD

Last Tuesday, I was at the Sydney Archdiocesan Clergy Conference. The topic of the discussion was assisted suicide that was legalised under the title Voluntary Assisted Death (VAD). As of 28 November 2023, such suicides are legal in NSW, prompting to think that it is okay to end one's life voluntarily.

People at large seem to share the philosophy that a life of dependence on others lacks dignity. In reality, we begin and end our lives as vulnerable people, relying on others and responsible to others. Only for a certain period of our lives we are relatively "autonomous agents". Therefore, losing autonomy doesn't mean losing dignity.

We Christians learn from Christ and his cross. We do not despair at suffering. We recognise the limits of medicine. We all are destined to die one day. But until then we care for each other and accompany our Christian brothers and sisters. The family members, health professional, pastoral worker, and the priest are to offer best palliative care to the terminally sick specially. Like other priests, I am available to accompany the seriously sick from the beginning of their ordeal.

I have left a few copies of a booklet titled, COMPANION GUIDE "To Witness and to Accompany with Christian Hope" at the entrance of the Church. It is an abridged version of the Document produced by the Australian Bishops Conference. Help yourself with one.

Writings by the Fathers of the Church

Christian wisdom

From a sermon on the Beatitudes by Saint Leo the Great

The Lord then goes on to say: *Blessed are those* who hunger and thirst for righteousness, for they shall be filled. This hunger is not for bodily food, this thirst is not for any earthly drink: it is a longing to be blessed with righteousness, and, by penetrating the secret of all mysteries, to be filled with the Lord himself.

Happy is the soul that longs for the food of righteousness and thirsts for this kind of drink; it would not seek such things if it had not already savoured their delight. When the soul hears the voice of the Spirit saying to it through the prophet: *Taste and see that the Lord is good*, it has already received a portion of God's goodness, and is on fire with love, the love that gives joy of the utmost purity. It counts as nothing all that belongs to time; it is entirely consumed with desire to eat and drink the food of righteousness. The soul lays hold of the true meaning of the first and great commandment: *You shall love the Lord God with your whole heart, and your whole mind and your whole strength*, for to love God is nothing else than to love righteousness.

Finally, just as concern for one's neighbour is added to love of God, so the virtue of mercy is added to the desire for righteousness, as it is said: *Blessed* are the merciful, for God will be merciful to them.

Remember, Christian, the surpassing worth of the wisdom that is yours. Bear in mind the kind of school in which you are to learn your skills, the rewards to which you are called. Mercy itself wishes you to be merciful, righteousness itself wishes you to be righteous, so that the Creator may shine forth in his creature, and the image of God be reflected in the mirror of the human heart as it imitates his qualities. The faith of those who live their faith is a serene faith. What you long for will be given you; what you love will be yours for ever.

Since it is by giving alms that everything is pure for you, you will also receive that blessing which is promised next by the Lord: *Blessed are the* pure of heart, for they shall see God. Dear friends, great is the happiness of those for whom such a reward is prepared. Who are the clean of heart if not those who strive for those virtues we have mentioned above? What mind can conceive, what words can express the great happiness of seeing God? Yet human nature will achieve this when it has been transformed so that it sees the Godhead no longer in a mirror or obscurely but face to face – the Godhead that no man has been able to see. In the inexpressible joy of this eternal vision, human nature will possess what eve has not seen or ear heard, what man's heart has never conceived.

Reflection on Gospel Mark 7:31-37

Gospel Focus - Ephphatha

The healing that Jesus works in this passage is perhaps one of the most 'physical' of His healing actions. He puts His fingers in the man's ears and places spittle on his tongue. It is an incredibly intimate contact with a complete stranger and someone regarded as outcast and unclean because of his disabilities. When Jesus speaks the word of healing, Ephphatha ('Be opened'), He appears to be speaking not only to the man but to all those listening. Be open to the possibility of embracing those you have cast out; be open to a different understanding of Messiah.

Scriptural context – Isaiah's Prophecy

All three synoptic gospel writers were at pains to demonstrate that Jesus was the fulfilment of the prophecies of the scriptures. This reference to Isaiah's prophecy appears in all three synoptic gospels. It is perhaps most familiar in the context of the Gospel of Luke, where the gospel writer actually combines it with a different passage from Isaiah and portrays Jesus as reading it in the synagogue as an announcement of His mission (Lk 4: 16-21). It is good to have the Isaiah text as the first reading this week and then see the way it is referred to in the gospel of the day.

Living the Gospel – Open to compassion

When Isaiah described the signs by which the Messiah would be recognised, he identified those people who were isolated from society by their physical afflictions. He portrayed a Messiah who released them from those afflictions and allowed them to re-enter society. That is what Jesus did time and time again. In the healing of the deaf and dumb man, Jesus called on all those around Him to also be opened – that their hearts may be opened to compassion. Jesus calls to us through today's gospel to also be open to compassion and open to the needs of those around us.

REFLECTION TWENTY-THIRD SUNDAY in Ordinary Time Year B

It's difficult not to make distinctions. Invariably, we favour some people over others. For example: we choose our friends, we choose a person to be our husband or wife, we choose 'sides' in disputes, we choose to avoid some people, and we choose to forgive some people and condemn others.

In the second reading, St James calls on believers never to make distinctions or show favour on the basis of social class, wealth, position, status or power. Everyone is to be treated equally regardless of their social background, and when it comes to worship, there are to be no seats of honour set aside for VIPs! Everyone ought to feel equally welcome and valued.

St Paul has a similar vision. In his letter to the Galatians (3:28) he declares that in virtue of baptism, "there is no longer Jew or Greek, there is no longer slave or free, there is no longer male and female, for all of you are one in Christ Jesus."

Jesus doesn't make distinctions based on social class. In fact, the gospels portray Him as having particular concern for the poor, the outcast, the voiceless, the afflicted, the vulnerable and the weak. Today's gospel is a classic example. A deaf man with a speech impediment is brought to Jesus by his friends.

In such an oral and aural culture where people were generally illiterate, not to be able to speak or hear properly was a significant disadvantage. Such people were virtually invisible. They couldn't communicate, and they couldn't be communicated with, in any meaningful way. Thankfully, the man in

the story is blessed to have caring friends who bring him to Jesus who has a reputation for giving new life.


Jesus gives very personal attention to the man. He takes him away from the crowd, so that they can be alone. Although the man can't hear or speak, he can experience the sense of touch, and so Jesus touches his ears, puts His fingers into them, and touches the man's tongue with His own spittle. Jesus also looks up to heaven, in prayer, for it was Jesus' relationship with God that will bring new life to the man.

It's important to remember that the man was not a Jew. The Decapolis ("ten cities) was predominantly Gentile territory. But, there's no distinction here. Jesus is the Messiah for all nations. He saw a brother in need, and in solidarity, lovingly reached out to him.

St James challenges us to 'look around' our faith community. Do we see any unhealthy favouritism? Are there people being forgotten, ignored or made to feel unwelcome? Are there voices not being heard? Are there people being discouraged from sharing their gifts and talents, or from becoming involved? Are people's contributions being devalued?

Hopefully, such things are not happening; however, it's important for us all to 'keep our eyes and ears open'.

Fr Thomas is leading a Bible study on the Gospel of Mark.


