From the Pastor

Pope Francis in Oceania

Pope Francis' recent visit to Oceania, which included Indonesia, Papua New Guinea, Timor-Leste, and Singapore, showcases his resilience and courage despite ongoing health challenges. The trip was his longest Apostolic Journey at the age of 87, following multiple surgeries and health setbacks in recent years, including colon surgery in 2021 and abdominal surgery in 2023. His health has been a point of concern, yet he was determined on the mission to reach even the most distant parts of the world.

Visiting Indonesia, Pope Francis emphasized the importance of cooperation between different religious communities, particularly between Christians and Muslims, in promoting peace and understanding. During a significant interreligious meeting at the Istiqlal Mosque in Jakarta, he encouraged leaders to work together for the common good and to combat extremism through dialogue and cooperation.

The senior parishioners might remember their childhood days when going to functions in the churches of other denominations, let alone Muslim Mosque, was anathema. Times have changed. Even the pontiff visits the prayer places of a religion with a bad reputation in international politics for its contribution to militant Islam. Last December, I visited Sheikh Zayed Grand Mosque in Abu Dhabi. To my surprise, at the entrance there was a huge picture of Pope Francis with the Imam from his visit of the Mosque in 2019. Holy Father's message is clear. We need to work on harmony rather than division. The religious culture of our parish is not too diverse. The houses of prayer within the parish boundary are all Christian, diverse only in denomination. And shouldn't we be more proactive in our reach out?

In Papua New Guinea, Francis called for the stewardship of the environment. Drawing from his 2015 encyclical *Laudato Si'*, Pope Francis highlighted the need to protect the planet, particularly in regions that are vulnerable to the impacts of climate change. His message was one of solidarity with the poor and the marginalized, urging the Church and society to continue offering support to those in need. His message in Timor-Leste also was similar. The Church should continue to support not just spiritual, but also social and economic development.

The Social Justice Group of the parish get together each month to read *Laudato Si* and share reflections. The group seek inspiration for its mission and ministry from the encyclical. In turn our ministry can inspire others. Our Wilcannia mission prompted the Catholic Weekly to interview some of us, so that they can publish inspirational stories for wider benefit.

Writings by the Fathers of the Church

The cross is Christ's glory and triumph

From a discourse by Saint Andrew of Crete

We are celebrating the feast of the cross which drove away darkness and brought in the light. As we keep this feast, we are lifted up with the crucified Christ, leaving behind us earth and sin so that we may gain the things above. So great and outstanding a possession is the cross that he who wins it has won a treasure. Rightly could I call this treasure the fairest of all fair things and the costliest, in fact as well as in name, for on it and through it and for its sake the riches of salvation that had been lost were restored to us.

Had there been no cross, Christ could not have been crucified. Had there been no cross, life itself could not have been nailed to the tree. And if life had not been nailed to it, there would be no streams of immortality pouring from Christ's side, blood and water for the world's cleansing. The legal bond of our sin would not be cancelled, we should not have attained our freedom, we should not have enjoyed the fruit of the tree of life and the gates of paradise would not stand open. Had there been no cross, death would not have been trodden underfoot, nor hell despoiled.

Therefore, the cross is something wonderfully great and honourable. It is great because through the cross the many noble acts of Christ found their

consummation – very many indeed, for both his miracles and his sufferings were fully rewarded with victory. The cross is honourable because it is both the sign of God's suffering and the trophy of His victory. It stands for His suffering because on it He freely suffered unto death. But it is also His trophy because it was the means by which the devil was wounded and death conquered; the barred gates of hell were smashed, and the cross became the one common salvation of the whole world.

The cross is called Christ's glory; it is saluted as His triumph. We recognise it as the cup He longed to drink and the climax of the sufferings He endured for our sake. As to the cross being Christ's glory, listen to His words: Now is the Son of Man glorified, and in Him God is glorified, and God will glorify Him at once. And again: Father, glorify Me with the glory I had with You before the world came to be. And once more: "Father, glorify Your name." Then a voice came from heaven: "I have glorified it and will glorify it again." Here He speaks of the glory that would accrue to Him through the cross. And if you would understand that the cross is Christ's triumph, hear what He Himself also said: When I am lifted up, then I will draw all men to Myself. Now you can see that the cross is Christ's glory and triumph.

Reflection on Gospel Mark 8:27-35

Scriptural context – A Turning Point

This passage forms a crucial turning point in the Gospel of Mark. It occurs at the very mid-point of the gospel – the end of chapter 8 in a 16 chapter gospel. From this point on the gospel takes a greater focus on what it means to be a disciple and Jesus' movement towards Jerusalem. This passage in which Peter professes his faith in Jesus as the Messiah is immediately followed by the account of the Transfiguration. From this point onwards, the gospel writer reveals the growing understanding of Jesus' identity that until now has been wrapped in secrecy.

Gospel Focus – Peter's insight

When Peter answers Jesus' question, he demonstrates the disciples' dawning awareness of Jesus' true identity. It is the first occasion that the disciples are called to own what they think about Jesus. However, when Jesus begins to spell out what being the Messiah reality means – persecution and death – Peter tries to convince Jesus that He doesn't need to go down that path. Jesus turns on Peter and snaps, 'Get behind me, Satan!' It is a reminder of the desert temptation Jesus had to face at the start of His ministry when He wrestled with what sort of messiah He was called to be.

Scriptural context - Sandwich technique

The Gospel of Mark is famous for a technique of 'sandwiching' stories or sections between two related events to bring what is sandwiched into greater focus. This gospel passage falls within a significant sandwich that runs from 8:22 (the healing of a blind man at Bethsaida) to 10:52 (the healing of blind Bartimaeus). The healings of blindness that surround the sandwich reflect the lack of 'sight' that the disciples have. The 'meat' of the sandwich is all about the disciples not really understanding Jesus' mission and what it means to truly be a disciple. Read the whole section from 8:22-10:52 and see how it works.

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REFLECTION TWENTY-FOURTH SUNDAY in Ordinary Time Year B

With the reading from the Gospel of Mark (Chapter 8), we come to a turning point in Jesus' public ministry, before the journey back to Jerusalem where He will be crucified.

Jesus asks His disciples: "Who do people say that I am?" 28 And then, "But who do *you* say that I am?"

Having witnessed His authoritative teaching, His powerful acts of healing and His wonderful miracles, Peter replies on behalf of them all: "You are the Messiah."

And how they and all of Israel longed for the coming of the Messiah. But what the disciples are slow to understand is that this is not the Messiah that they had longed for and expected. It was unimaginable for them that Jesus, as Messiah and God's Beloved Son, was to suffer and die.

Instead of commending Peter for his response, not even confirming it, Jesus instead proceeds to speak to them of His impending passion and death.

The disciples' slowness to understand, their blindness, their struggle, and their resistance to this understanding that Jesus' mission would lead to His arrest, suffering and death is starkly depicted in Mark's gospel. We see it here in Chapter 8, again in Chapter 9 and again in Chapter 10. They just don't get it!

So, as Jesus, accompanied by His disciples, journeys to Jerusalem where He will be arrested tortured and crucified, the disciples slowly progress on a journey of coming to understand Jesus' identity and mission as the Messiah.

In our lives we too, each and every one of us, struggle in various ways to understand Jesus, our Saviour, and His role in our lives and in the world. We too often have misguided expectations of God. And we too, each one of us, are called to respond to Jesus' question: Who do you say that I am? What do I mean to you in your life?

Jesus, having explained to His disciples the suffering and death that He will soon endure, goes on to say to them that they too will also face suffering. He tells them: "If any want to become My followers, let them deny themselves and take up their cross and follow Me."

So too for us. Discipleship will inevitably require self-denial and taking up one's own cross. There's no denying it! And each one's cross is uniquely their own.

When we make the Sign of the Cross, "in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit," we identify and mark ourselves as follower of Jesus, the Crucified and Risen One. Our cross-making in the Sign of the Cross symbolises the reality of suffering not just in Jesus' life but in our lives as His followers, not just His cross but the cross that is ours to carry in our lives. It reminds us too of the resurrection and life of the world to come.

We are not alone in our journey. Jesus is with us every step of the way.




