From the Pastor

Catholics and Religious Plurality

"All religions are a path to God: Pope" was one of the headlines of CathNews last Monday (Sept 16). "They are like different languages in order to arrive at God, but God is God for all," said the Pope, who had set aside his prepared text and spoke largely off the cuff. "Since God is God for all, then we are all children of God." The Pontiff made his remarks during an interreligious meeting with young people held at a Catholic junior college, just prior to departing Singapore for his return flight to Rome. It must have been like dropping of a bomb shattering the long-held conviction of some Catholics. Has the Pontiff gone off the track in his Catholicity?

The Second Vatican Council (1962–1965) teaches that while Christ is the definitive way to salvation, truth and goodness can be found in other religions. This perspective is most clearly articulated in the document *Nostra Aetate*, the Declaration on the Relation of the Church to non-Christian religions.

The Church recognises the need for respect and dialogue with other religions. "Men look to their different religions for an answer to the unsolved riddles of human existence." (Nostra Aetate, # 1). And other faiths like Hinduism, Buddhism, Islam, and Judaism often contain elements of truth, goodness, and a sincere search for God. "The Church rejects nothing that is true and holy in these religions." (Nostra Aetate, # 2)

While acknowledging the presence of truth in other religions, the Catholic Church teaches that Jesus Christ is the full and definitive revelation of God. The Church believes that salvation comes through Christ, but it also recognizes that God's grace can work in mysterious ways, including through non-Christian religions.

All individuals have the right to seek the truth about God in their own way. This respect for conscience is grounded in human dignity, as outlined in another Vatican II document, *Dignitatis Humanae*. Nostra Aetate also says "The Church reproves, as foreign to the mind of Christ, any discrimination against men or harassment of them because of their race, colour, condition of life or religion." (# 5)

While respecting other religions, we continue to believe in the importance of evangelization, sharing the Gospel, and inviting others to encounter Christ. We as Church is a missionary body, but this mission is carried out with a spirit of love and respect, not coercion.

"All men form but one community. This is so because all stem from the one stock which God created to people the entire earth." (Nostra Aetate, #1)

Writings by the Fathers of the Church

Faith is crowned by love and perseverance

From the final exhortation of Saint Andrew Kim Taegŏn, priest and martyr Last Friday was the memorial of the Korean Martyrs

My brethren and dear friends, think about this and reflect on it: from the beginning of time God has ordered the heavens, the earth, and all things. Consider the creation of man in this light and reflect on why He has created man, each man, in His image and likeness: why, and with what purpose.

If, then, placed as we are in this world full of danger and misery, we do not know the Lord our creator, what is the point in having been born? Our life is pointless. Thanks to God, we have come into this world. Also thanks to God, we have received baptism, we have entered the Church, and we have received the glorious name of disciples of the Lord. But what use would that name be if it did not correspond to reality? If it does not, then it is in vain that we have come into the world and entered into the Church. Moreover, such a state of affairs would not serve the Lord and His grace. It would be better for us never to have been born than to receive the grace of the Lord and then sin against Him.

Look at the farmer sowing his field. He ploughs the earth at the appropriate time, then he manures it, and he cultivates the growing seed without caring how hard his work is under a hot sun. When harvest time arrives, if the ears are fat then he forgets his labour and his sweat because his heart is full of joy and he delights in the harvest. But if the grains are shrivelled and there is nothing but straw and empty husks, then the farmer remembers his sweat and heavy labour: the more he has worked the field, the more he turns his back on it.

It is the same with the Lord. The Earth is His field; we men are His seed; His manure is grace. By the Incarnation and the Redemption He waters us with His blood so that we can grow and ripen. When the time for harvest comes at the Day of Judgement, if by His grace we are found to be ripe, we shall know the joy of the kingdom as the adoptive children of God. But if we are found to be unripe, we shall have become enemies of God instead of the adoptive sons we were, and we shall receive the eternal punishment we deserve.

My very dear brethren, know this: our Lord Jesus, coming down here, Himself suffered pains beyond counting: by His Passion He founded the Church and by the passion of His faithful He makes it grow. The powers of this world may well oppress it and attack it, but they will never have victory over it. After the Ascension of Jesus, from the time of the Apostles until now, the holy Church has grown everywhere in the middle of persecution.

It is fifty or sixty years now since the holy Church entered our land of Korea. The faithful have endured persecution over and over again. Today it is beginning once more: many of our friends in faith, and I myself, are in prison. You too are under threat. Since we form one body, how can we not have sad hearts? How can we not, as human beings, feel the pain of separation?

All the same, as Scripture tells us, God takes care of the least of the hairs of our head and nothing escapes His infinite knowledge. How then can we see this persecution except as something ordered by the Lord either as a prize or as a punishment? Follow therefore the will of God, fight with all your heart for our divine leader Jesus, and you will vanquish the demon of this world, who has already been vanquished by Christ.

I implore you: do not forget fraternal love but help one another and persevere until the Lord takes pity on us and ends this persecution.

There are twenty of us here and, thank God, all is well with us so far. If one of us is put to death I beg you not to forget his family.

There are many other things I could say to you, but how to say them all in a letter? So I will end here. As for us, in a short time we will go into combat. I beg you to keep yourselves faithful so that we can all be reunited in the joys of heaven. With all my heart, I embrace you.

Reflection on Gospel Mark 9:30-37

Historical Context - Messianic expectation

The term Messiah means anointed one. In the era of the Kings of Israel, quite literally someone was designated King by being anointed – having oil poured over their head. It's easy to see that when the people of Israel spoke about a 'Messiah' (an 'anointed one') who would restore justice and peace, they had in mind a great King. They even expected that the new king would come from the line of David, the line of the great kings of their history. Jesus was working against centuries of tradition when He tried to get the disciples to see that the Messiah could be something else.

Scriptural context – Three predictions

This gospel event is the second of three occasions in the gospel of Mark when Jesus clearly makes a prediction about His death and subsequent resurrection. They occur in chapters 8, 9 and 10 of the gospel and all three are associated with the disciples' lack of understanding about the mission and fate of Jesus. In each case, Jesus could not speak more plainly about what will happen to Him and yet the disciples fail to understand. These three chapters have an overarching image of the disciples' 'blindness' to the truth of Jesus' message.

Have you thought? Last of all?

Jesus tells His disciples that if anyone wants to be first, they must make themself last of all and servant of all. This is as challenging to us today as it was to the disciples and early Christians. Our world seems to revolve around position, status and power – whoever has the most toys wins! But what Jesus advocated was a leadership based on being of service to others. Being powerful simply means you are in a position to help even more people. Putting yourself last, instead of first, gives respect, dignity and power to others rather than to yourself.

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REFLECTION TWENTY-FIFTH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME YEAR B

This week's reading from the Book of Wisdom illustrates the kind of thinking that was common in the ancient world: If God is with someone then, assured of God's protection, they will prosper. If, on the other hand, they are suffering and not prospering, then it must be that God is not on their side.

How, then, would the ancient world have understood the teaching of Jesus in the gospel? "The Son of Man will be delivered into the hands of men; they will put Him to death." If His enemies were to kill Him, let alone if He was to be publicly humiliated and suffer, surely He could not be the messiah for whom the people waited.

This is the second time in the Gospel of Mark that Jesus has prophesied His death. At this point, the disciples don't understand and are too confused and afraid to ask Jesus what He really means.

When instead the disciples talk about who among them is the greatest, they still dream of becoming earthly lords and princes of status, power and authority. But before we judge the disciples too harshly, we must remember that this story from Mark's gospel has been recorded to mirror our own sins and temptations. We too have ambitions and desires that impede our ability to respond to what Jesus wants from us.

Jesus is charting a very unusual and very new path to what it means to be great in the eyes of God, one that cuts against the culture of His day. In His eyes, serving God means loving and serving the lowliest and those most in need.

When Jesus instructs His disciples to welcome children, He is taking the side of the most neglected, least powerful, and least respected members of society.

For Jesus, greatness is not in career achievement, status, power, attention or appreciation in the world. Instead, Jesus calls us to set aside our desires and ambitions to get ahead. As Jesus says elsewhere in the gospels, it is those who are willing to lose their lives who will find life. It is those who put their own egos last and lowest who will be first and greatest in the eyes of God.

St James reflects on this mystery in the second reading. He describes the disciples' self-interest and ambition as told in today's gospel as destined to result in "disharmony, and wicked things of every kind being done".

But look at the benefits that come from discarding this self-centred way of living and thinking. James describes the wisdom that Jesus brings as bringing "peace". It makes us "kindly and considerate", "full of compassion", and "shows itself by doing good".

There in that way of living is true freedom and true greatness.

Safeguarding children focuses on the prevention of **abuse and harm** to children, young people and also includes adults that find themselves in a vulnerable situation.

Everyone is responsible for the safety of children and we are to be proactive in reducing the risk to children and help bring a cultural change towards child protection.

Information for Parents - what should I know as a Parent?

If you **engage a tutor**, private trainer, music teacher, party entertainers etc., you should ask for a Working With Children Check clearance number. See more information at https://ocg.nsw.gov.au/parents-and-carers/what-parents-need-know-about-working-children-check

It's the law that tutors or coaches who work with your children must have a **Working With Children Check.**

What do parents need to know if your child is employed?

In NSW there are specific laws to protect the safety and wellbeing of children under the age of 15 years who are **employed** as actors, performers, and in door-to-door sales, and children under the age of 16 who are employed as models.

The Office of the Children's Guardian has developed the SAFE series. Four children's books containing personal **safety messages for children** that parents can utilise when explaining personal issues, such as to:

- Help your child identify the parts of their **body** that are private
- Help your child understand their feelings
- Encourage your child to think about five people who they trust to help them if they
 feel scared, sad or upset

Fact sheet: Information for Children about Online Safety



The online world is a fun place to talk to friends, play games and watch videos. Going online can be very similar to exploring, when you explore any place it is important to know how to be safe. If you follow these points when going online you can be sure to have a fun but also safe time.

- Not all messages you receive online are nice. Some messages might make you feel uncomfortable, scared or not quite right. Don't reply to any messages that make you feel like this. Tell a trusted adult like mum, dad, aunty or uncle.
- Do not share any personal information online. Your personal information like your full name, date of birth and phone numbers need to be kept safe.
- Once you share something online it can be very difficult to take it back, it can even be shared or copied by someone else. Always ask before you share something online.
- Make sure you set strong passwords.
 Strong passwords contain a lot of letters and are hard to guess. Never give your password away, if you think you will forget write it down.

- Some things you see online can be a trick and not be true. Sometimes people can even pretend to be another person online. If you think someone is pretending to be another person tell a trusted adult like mum, dad, aunty or uncle.
- If you make video calls or if you receive a video call do it in an open area such as the living room or kitchen and make sure mum, dad or guardian can see you.
- Sometimes you can see something online that makes you feel uncomfortable like a photo or video. Make sure you tell an adult what you see; they can make sure you are ok and help you not to see something like that again.
- Make sure you ask mum, dad or carer before you download, install or buy anything on your device.
- Don't add or friend people online that you don't know.

What is Cyberbullying?

Cyberbullying is the use of technology to bully or hurt someone.

Cyberbullying can be:

- Mean messages
- Leaving you out or ignoring you online
- Spreading lies about you online
- Sharing something online that can hurt you or make you look bad

Cyberbullying can make you feel isolated and like everyone is out to get you but that's not the case.

Make sure you talk to people you trust.

Support

If you feel uncomfortable, worried, anxious, nervous or embarrassed because of something online please tell a trusted adult. A trusted adult will tell the appropriate people to get you help.




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Season of Creation
