# From the Pastor

# Holidays, Jubilee

Another period of School Holidays has commenced.

Learning is hard work, and formation needs focussed and creative energy. Therefore, these term breaks are important in the schooling calendar. Prior to Haberfield, after twelve years in my previous parish, I took six months of sabbatical leave. That was great. I am better focussed and more energetic now. That's what happens with a good break. My Sabbatical was not an idling time. Sure enough it was a break from the routine pastoral life of the parish. But the days were punctuated with prayers, study, spiritual direction, long walks, visit to museums and cinemas as well as cultural tours.

As Christians we do not take break from our spirituality. Holidays are times of rejuvenation and spiritual renewal. According to the Bible, God rested on the seventh day after creation (Genesis 2:2-3). Inspired by this biblical teaching, Jewish people developed the concept of Sabbath for rest and to honour God.

We also observe Sunday break from routine work to reconnect our faith and celebrate Eucharistic fellowship. For us, Christmas and Easter are more than just breaks from work—they are times of worship, contemplation, and glorification of God's actions through the birth, death, and resurrection of Jesus Christ.

Incidentally, 2025 is the Holy Year of Church's Jubilee. The concept of holidays and the Jubilee in the Old Testament are closely related, as both emphasize rest, renewal, and restoration, reflecting God's desire for balance in human life and society. The Jubilee, described in Leviticus 25, was a special event that occurred every 50 years. It was a time when the Israelites were commanded to release slaves, forgive debts, return land to its original owners, and allow the land to rest by ceasing agricultural activity. The Jubilee was meant to reset the social, economic, and ecological systems, ensuring that no one in the community remained perpetually disadvantaged and that the land itself had a chance to recover from constant cultivation. The concept embodies God's concern for justice, mercy, and restoration for both people and the environment.

The life and teachings of St Vincent DePaul, whose memorial was last Friday, is an inspiration for a faith life imbedded with Compassion and Justice. In that sense, St Vincent was an epitome of Jubilee.

# Writings by the Fathers of the Church

Serving the poor is to be preferred above all things

A writing of St Vincent de Paul

Last Friday, 27 September, was the Feast of St Vincent de Paul

Even though the poor are often rough and unrefined, we must not judge them from external appearances nor from the mental gifts they seem to have received. On the contrary, if you consider the poor in the light of faith, then you will observe that they are taking the place of the Son of God who chose to be poor.

Although in His passion He almost lost the appearance of a man and was considered a fool by the Gentiles and a stumbling block by the Jews, He showed them that His mission was to preach to the poor: He sent me to preach the good news to the poor. We also ought to have this same spirit and imitate Christ's actions, that is, we must take care of the poor, console them, help them, support their cause.

Since Christ willed to be born poor, He chose for Himself disciples who were poor. He made Himself the servant of the poor and shared their poverty. He went so far as to say that He would consider every deed which either helps or harms the poor as done for or against Himself. Since God surely loves the poor, He also loves those who love the poor. For when one person holds another dear, He also includes in His affection anyone who loves or serves the one He loves. That is why we hope that God will love us for the sake of the poor. So when we visit the poor and needy, we try to

understand the poor and weak. We sympathise with them so fully that we can echo Paul's words: I have become all things to all men. Therefore, we must try to be stirred by our neighbours' worries and distress. We must beg God to pour into our hearts sentiments of pity and compassion and to fill them again and again with these dispositions.

It is our duty to prefer the service of the poor to everything else and to offer such service as quickly as possible. If a needy person requires medicine or other help during prayer time, do whatever has to be done with peace of mind. Offer the deed to God as your prayer. Do not become upset or feel guilty because you interrupted your prayer to serve the poor. God is not neglected if you leave Him for such service. One of God's works is merely interrupted so that another can be carried out. So when you leave prayer to serve some poor person, remember that this very service is performed for God. Charity is certainly greater than any rule. Moreover, all rules must lead to charity. Since she is a noble mistress, we must do whatever she commands. With renewed devotion, then, we must serve the poor, especially outcasts and beggars. They have been given to us as our masters and patrons.

# Reflection on Gospel Mark 9:38-43. 45. 47-48

# Have you thought? Jealousy

The disciples are portrayed as being jealous of someone healing in the name of Jesus. It is almost an intellectual property argument – you can't use Jesus' name to heal, only we can 'cause we're with Jesus. Their attitude sounds quite childish but it is an attitude we encounter all the time – and are perhaps guilty of ourselves at times. In our world that encourages competitive behaviour at every turn, Jesus' attitude is a challenging one – if good is being done, why care who gets the credit for it? Perhaps politicians would get more done if they weren't concerned about getting credit for what they do.

# Living the Gospel – Cut it out!

The thought of cutting off a hand or foot or tearing out an eye seems a bit extreme if taken literally. Whilst Jesus didn't mean for us to do a bit of self-surgery, if we find ourselves caught in behaviour that is self-destructive or hurtful to others, the only solution is quite literally to 'cut it out'. We know within ourselves when our actions are life-giving or life-harming. Surprisingly we often persist with harmful behaviour even when we know it's harmful. Jesus' solution is simple: cut out the negative behaviour and get back on track. That's the principle behind Reconciliation.

# Gospel Focus – Anyone not against us is for us

It is sometimes quite baffling why the movement for ecumenical dialogue is so laboured and apparently delivering such limited results. It seems that it is human nature to dwell much more on what makes us different rather than on what we have in common. Unfortunately, efforts to build dialogue between Christian churches seem to inevitably turn up the differences that impede dialogue more than the commonalities that foster dialogue. Jesus made it clear that 'anyone who is not against us is for us'. Perhaps if we focus on the common goal of leading people to Jesus we can get beyond the differences that set us against each other.

# REFLECTION TWENTY-SIXTH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME YEAR B

A flock of geese flying in formation is a beautiful sight. Scientists who have researched why they fly in a V-formation have discovered some fascinating details.

First, it conserves their energy. Each bird flies slightly higher than the bird in front of it. This decreases wind resistance for each bird. Second, the geese take turns at being the leader and fall back in the group when they get tired. This enables them to fly for a long time before they need to stop for a rest.

The tired geese support the group from behind and recharge themselves as they fly at a slower speed. Third, the V-formation enables them to keep track of every bird in the group, and to communicate and coordinate with the group. In fact, research has also discovered that flying in formation is so beneficial that other birds such as ducks, ibis, swans, seagulls, pelicans, and flamingos also fly in formation.

Valuing the initiative and contribution of each person at different points in their journey and drawing the best from each member in the group are also important tenets in faith communities.

In this week's's gospel, Jesus discourages the disciples from preventing a man from working a miracle in his name. Jesus tells them, "You must not stop him: no one who works a miracle in My name is likely to speak evil of me. Anyone who is not against us is for us". Jesus thus redirects the

On **Sundays of October, after 6pm Mass**, again the Blessed Sacrament will be exposed for adoration. You can join the adoration praying rosary or silent prayer or pray with the Bible.

disciples' initial focus on excluding those who may not be in their immediate circle, to emphasising the commitment to doing the will of God: healing, teaching, and proclaiming the good news that God's love is available to everyone.

Today, we are called to embrace diversity amongst the faithful and to appreciate that the variety of our gifts and talents nourishes and enriches the entire community. Jesus speaks with great tenderness of everyone who acts in faith and good will, calling them His "little ones". He encourages us to be generous and to not exclude anyone from whole-hearted and loving service of God.

The community in Taizé, Saône-et-Loire, Burgundy, France is a modern example of a community of faith which embraces diversity. When Brother Roger founded the community towards the end of World War Two, it initially sheltered war refugees. Taizé is now renowned for being an ecumenical community of brothers, who have created beautiful music and work for peace and justice.

Currently, it comprises eighty brothers from Catholic, Anglican, Protestant traditions, from nearly thirty countries. Brother Matthew, the current prior, penned a beautiful prayer recently which describes this spirit of diversity in service:

God the Creator, all that comes from Your hands is good. Help us to discern Your presence in the beauty of Your creation, and to rejoice that we are a part of it. May Your light shine on every corner of this earth and on every creature with which we share our common home.




# **Legislation affecting Parish Volunteers**

# **Mandatory Reporting**

Children and Young Persons (Care and Protection) Act 1998 (NSW) ('Care Act')

Mandatory reporting is the legislative requirement for those who work with children to report suspected child abuse and neglect to the **Child Protection Helpline**, Dept of Communities & Justice.



It is mandatory to report suspicions of risk of harm in relation to children under the age of 16 years. The Care Act gives grounds for intervention to cover young people up to 18 years of age, but it is not mandatory to report suspicions of risk of harm in relation to young people aged 16 and 17 years of age.

# **Reportable Conduct Scheme**

Children's Guardian Act 2019 (NSW)

The scheme covers all workers including Clergy, Parish employees and volunteers who are required to hold a Working with Children Check.

### What does it mean for You?

As a Volunteer, holding a WWCC, you are obligated to report alleged reportable conduct of other volunteers.

How to report an allegation of reportable conduct or receive assistance with a Mandatory Report?


